The essential PNW boat winterization checklist

DON'T BE A STRANGER

Marty suggests visit your boat every few weeks during the winter, especially before and after a storm. And if you see something amiss with a neighboring vessel, tell the marina or call the emergency contact number on the boat (if they have one).

As the first fall storms whip through area marinas and boatyards, it will be easy to identify the prepared from the ill prepared. For some, halyards will be restrained properly, dock lines and fenders will be set with care, and down below, the batteries will be topped up while a dehumidifier keeps away mold and mildew.

But many boats will be left unprepared for the impending storms of the season. Sails will come unfurled only to be turned to rags by high winds, fuel tanks will generate filter clogging condensation and algae, dock lines will chafe through before being replaced by a trusty live-aboard neighbor, and dinghies will be left to collect a season's worth of water.

Of course, the impending onset of winter doesn't keep every boater from getting out on the water in the Pacific Northwest. But for those who

use their boats less frequently during the wetter, windier, colder and darker months of the year, it's prudent to properly prepare your vessel for the season. And if you don't use your boat at all, it's a good idea to thoroughly decommission it so it's prepared to rest comfortably in its slip or cradle.

No matter how much you use your boat during the winter, though, completing some portion of a checklist will make it easier to commission and use it once the spring sunshine breaks through the clouds.

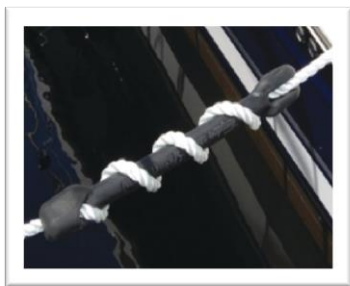

Easing the blow with Snubbers

The Fall and Winter storms will pound your boat and the docks. One way to protect them both and keep the cleats intact would be for tenants to use snubbers on your mooring lines. The snubbers reduce the shock from boat wakes that come crashing into the marina. You can find the snubbers at West Marine and Fisheries Supply. Please let us know if you have any questions about snubbers and how they will help the marinas.
